### Abstract

This is a collection of addresses and of essays, nearly all of which were published in various periodicals. The reviewer was at first startled to find a volume of collected papers at a stage in life where he could publish a volume of collected papers. On second thought the conclusion seemed justified that this was a present instance at least, even if it ought not be taken as a precedent in general. For all these papers deal with a single topic-the duty of the citizen to obtain freedom of thought and expression. The volume thus is not merely an author's definitive study, Freedom of Speech, published in 1928.
