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Inquisition texts have become central to the recent and ongoing debate in studies of medieval heresy over the degree to which heretical movements ought to be understood as the product of an orthodox agenda. The present book, a contribution to CUP's *Cambridge Studies in Medieval Life and Thought* series, responds to some of the more radical implications of that debate, though it is less concerned to adopt a position within that argument, or to

make a case for one side or the other, than it is to try to think out a methodology by which the difficulties of these texts can perhaps be navigated, and extremes of interpretation avoided. Caterina Bruschi approaches these issues through a study of the inquisition depositions contained in the Doat collection—seventeenth-century transcriptions of medieval texts, which preserve parts of the inquisitorial archive of southern France (and with...

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
