### President Bush, Biblical Faith, and the Politics of Religion

A cartoon in a recent issue of Time magazine depicts President Bush standing on Mount Sinai with two stone tablets in his hands. The tablets are inscribed with Bush's proposal to eliminate tax on stock dividends. Ironically, the cartoon depicts the president as a biblical figure leading his people out of bondage (tax bondage) and into freedom. The cartoon reflects Bush's own self-understanding. In his autobiographical foreword to the SBL's new journal, *Biblical Faith and the Politics of Religion*, the biblical story of Moses figures prominently in articulating his political leadership. While attending a church service in Austin, Texas (in 1998), Bush relates what is clearly a motivational "call story":

Pastor [Mark] Craig said that America is starved for honest leadership. He said, 'I want to lead my people to a land of milk and honey. Moses had a lot of people who followed him, but Moses' basic reaction was, 'Sorry, God, I'm busy. I've got a far more important job than that I should go to Pharaoh, and bring the sons of Israel out of Egypt. I'm a busy person,' Moses pleaded. But God did not, and Moses ultimately accepted the leadership,' Pastor Craig said, 'starved for leaders who have the moral courage to do what is right for the right reason. I want to step forward,' he acknowledged. 'Remember, even Moses had a call story,' he said.'

As Bush recalls, this sermon "spoke directly to my heart and I felt called to the mantle, as he saw it, and entered the Presidential race. As he said, "I've heard the call. I believe God wants me to run for president."

The foundations for this Mosaic self-perception had been laid during his childhood. He found religious conviction following a weekend with Billy Graham in 1964. It was the beginning of a new walk where I would continue to grow, starting to attend a weekly men's Bible study group in Midland, Texas.
