

# UK children go online: Surveying the experiences of young people and their parents.

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### Abstract

The research project: UK Children Go Online (UKCGO) aims to offer a rigorous and timely investigation of children's use of the internet. The project balances an assessment of online risks and opportunities in order to contribute to public debates and policy frameworks for children and young people's internet use. The research was funded by a Social Research Council grant under the 'e-Society' Programme, with co-funding from AOL, BSC, Children's Online and ITC. This report presents key findings from a major national, in-home, face to face survey, involving 1,511 9-19 year olds and 906 parents of the 9-17 year olds, using Random Location sampling across the country. The report complements the project's recent qualitative report on young people's experiences of the internet. The research was conducted using multi-media computer-assisted personal interviewing (CAPI) with children and a paper questionnaire with parents, between 12 January and 7 March 2004. In this report of findings from the UKCGO survey, all percentages are weighted in accordance with population statistics.
