

Taking stock of a year's worth of books in one's field: it's a humbling exercise. Holding them in your hands, you feel the years of effort, the passion and learning, the dedication to a vision and to argument. The experience filled me with appreciation for the many living moments in which we meet one another to talk about ideas, circulate work, question and debate, reflect and write. Like the end of François Truffaut's Fahrenhett 451, these books are speaking people, colleagues walking among colleagues who, when asked, recite the precious words they contain. And together they tell several diverging stories about the shape of our field: our values and preoccupations, our views into the archive and out into the world, our accounts to one another of what we do and why it's important.

What did I hear in these conversations? The paradigm of materialism continues to animate our criticism, above all because of the richness and plurality of "materialism" itself as a tradition of inquiry. Books on the relationship between drama and the political
