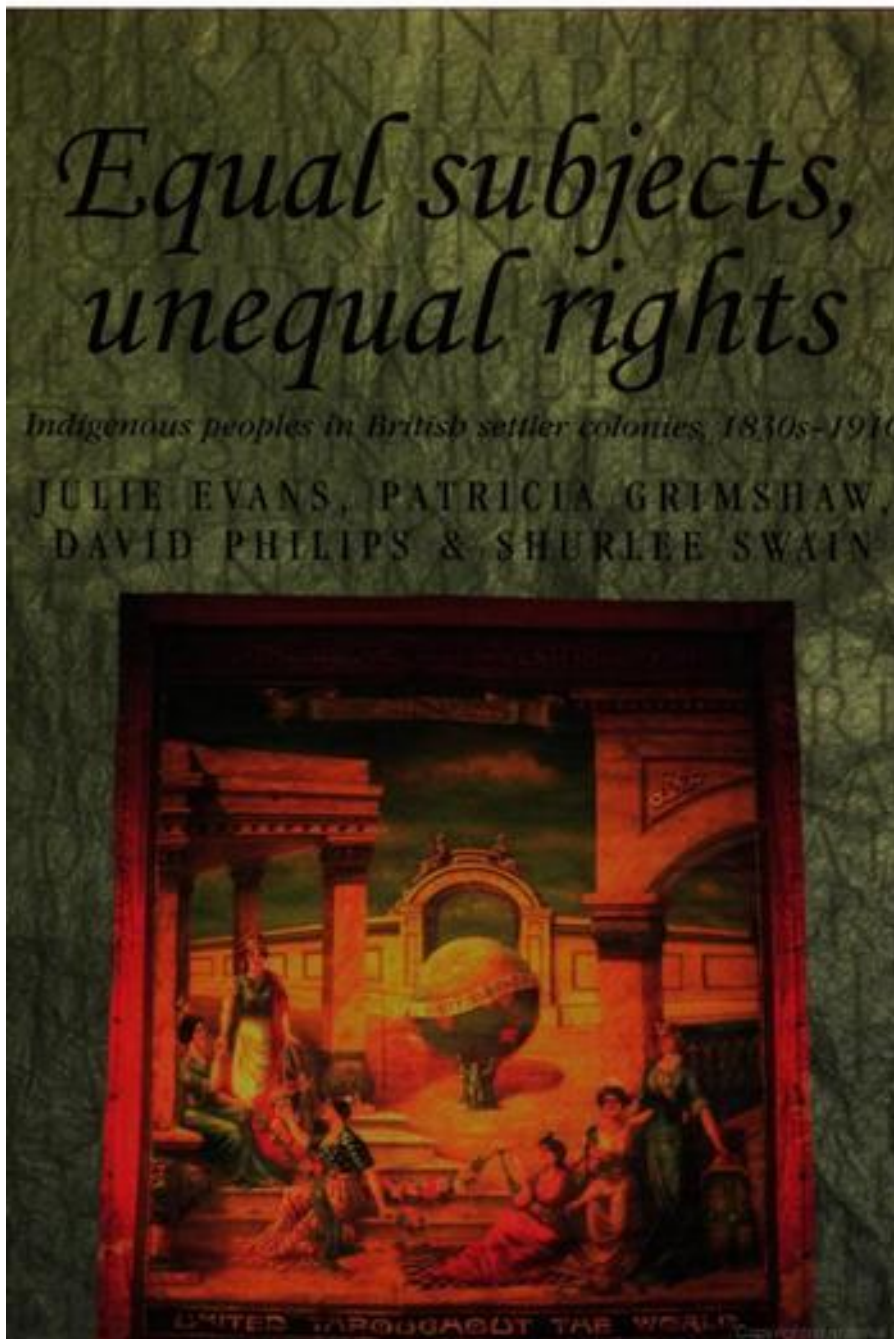

Abstract This book focuses on the ways in which the British settler colonies of Australia, Canada, New Zealand and South Africa, commencing with the imperial policies of the 1830s and ending with the national political settlements in place by the 1930s, provides an insight into the historical foundations of present-day controversies in these settler societies. The indigenous resistance meant that the governments preferred to grant citizenship rights to those indigenous people who accepted indigenous status. However, particular historical circumstances in the new democracies resulted in very different outcomes. In Australia, white people had political rights similar to those of white colonists; at the other, the Australian parliament denied the vote to indigenous people, laying foundations for apartheid, whilst Canada made enfranchisement conditional on assimilation.
