60 Hugh Morton 61 Weighing close to ten pounds, the volume features 1,634 pages, 349 illustrations, and 15 maps. The *Encyclopedia* was developed by Charles Reagan Wilson and William Ferris of the Center for the Study of Southern Culture at the University of Mississippi. It is the result of a ten-year project involving more than 800 scholars and writers in many fields. Appalachia is richly represented in the twenty-four thematic sections including black life, history and manners, religion, folklore, women's life, recreation, politics, the mythic South, urbanization, literature, music, violence and law, among others. Each section begins with a broad thematic essay and then moves into shorter biographical and topical entries ranging from broad historical themes to bits of whimsy indigenous to the region. The *Encyclopedia's* definition of the South is a cultural one: the South is found wherever Southern culture is found. The same is true of Appalachia and Appalachians. It will be a lucky recipient who finds the *Encyclopedia of Southern Culture* under his or her Christmas tree. It is a gift each can dip into and enjoy and never be bored for a minute—indeed, for a number of years.
