Bruce E. Bechtol, Jr., is a former intelligence officer with the Central Intelligence Agency and a retired Marine who has lived and worked in Korea from the Union Institute in Cincinnati, Ohio, and currently serves as an Assistant Professor of International Relations at the U.S. Marine Corps Command and Staff College. In addition to being author of *Red Rogue: The Persistent Challenge of North Korea* (2007) he has written nearly two dozen articles dealing with Korea in peer-reviewed journals to include the *Korea Observer*, the *International Journal of Korean Studies*, *Comparative Strategy*, *Pacific Focus*, the *Air Force and Society*, the *East Asian Review*, and the *International Journal of Korea Studies*. He is also the author of the forthcoming book, *Defiant Failed State: The Challenge of North Korea to International Security*, (Dulles, VA: Potomac Books, 2010, forthcoming).
