Abstract : The new edition of this popular introductory textbook on medical sociology incorporates more recent work in this rapidly growing discipline. It provides a comprehensive survey of the main areas of medical sociology, which doctors and anyone interested in the delivery and planning of health care services will find useful. After a brief outline of the sociological perspective, the sociological and psychological aspects of the delivery of health care are discussed.
