

Practical Divinization in Ecologically Threatened Times.

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Abstract:

Practical divinization describes the practice of connecting our spiritual and psychological development to consistency with the earth. This essay investigates the concept of Christian divinization in dialogue with Jung's conception of the self. Historically, the idea of divinization emerged from new concepts of personhood synthesized in the 1st century AD. The ancient roots of personhood illuminates concepts of self and divinization within a contemporary theological and psychological context. Annis Pratt's analysis of the archetype of "green-world epiphany," evident in much of the literature written in the past three centuries, exemplifies the ethos inherent in practical divinization. A new interpretation of Matthew's Gospel "imagines a female orientation of the text and further confirms the need for an embodied and fully participated relation to the earth. Practical divinization issues forth a call to action and a cause for hope in the face of ecological crisis."
