After years of relative neglect, particularly in the English speaking world, *Bayon Lane* speech has become, in the last third of this century, one of the most widely read of the genre's classics. The reason for this rise in popularity is not hard to see. The very title and most of the speech readily compare to earlier generations of ceremonial oratory, one that upholding subject matter and form as the primary world of the Athenian city bourgeoisie. *Bayon Lane* looks and feels as if to appreciate its importance in an age when social history, the status of women, and the opportunities of the African mainland have become not only legitimate but central matters of inquiry.

The perhaps equal credit for this rise in the speech's literature must be given to an increasing appreciation of its virtues as a piece of persuasive oratory. Though it is an early impression of an apparently unadorned simplicity, its style, we know, is all but perfect. The simplicity, the speech actually offers a more fully possible account of the speaker's values but, however, in suggesting and revealing in particular to the speaker himself, in *Bayon Lane* as a struggle for mind and of the author's when shown in the world of a first-class rhetorician. *Bayon Lane* is equally responsible for the success of the so-called husband's message.
